Cumberland HDRC and Rosehill Launch "The Art of Wellbeing" – A Creative Collaboration for Health, Expression, and Community Connection

Cumberland HDRC and Rosehill are thrilled to announce *The Art of Wellbeing*—a bold new creative project designed to bring communities together across the region in a celebration of health, self-expression, and collective imagination.

Developed in collaboration with a local artist, *The Art of Wellbeing* project aims to engage communities across Cumberland to co-produce a collaborative artistic piece that fosters awareness and discussion around health determinants and Cumberland Health Determinants Research Collaboration (HDRC). The project will use the power of visual arts to create meaningful expressions of health—both physical and mental—and explore how creativity can serve as a vital tool for individual and collective wellness, as well as health research.

The initiative will culminate in a public exhibition showcasing the community-created artwork, serving as a lasting testament to Cumberland's shared commitment to wellbeing.
